WELCOME TO APRIL!


Hello everyone!

WHAT I'VE BEEN UP TO IN MARCH

Early in March, I discovered the BookFuel book auction for National Energy Action, organized by <u>Vikki Patis</u> (also known as Victoria Hawthorne - @VikkiPatis on Twitter). I scrolled through all of the wonderful prizes on offer and put a couple of bids on things that I really liked the look of (and were within my price range). A few days later, I got a message from Vikki – I'd won a prize! I won a signed copy of <u>One Way Ticket to Paris</u> by Emma Robinson (@emmarobinsonuk), and <u>New Girl In Little Cove</u> by Damhnait Monaghan (@Downith). I was SO excited. I've read the former – and reviewed it down below – and the latter is next on my TBR.

Now onto my next WIP. I started writing it in the first lockdown, Spring 2020, and since then I've been rewriting it, tinkering with it, and wondering what the hell it's missing. In mid-March, I decided I'd procrastinated enough, and appealed on Twitter for five lessic beta readers. I found them, and they are in the process of reading the manuscript. So far, the two who have completed it have given me some invaluable feedback. God help me if I'd left in some of the stuff they've suggested I change! 
It might not be newsworthy per se, but I read a couple of books that broke me. One of those was <u>All My Mothers</u> by Joanna Glen. There's so much I want to say about it, but I still haven't found the words, despite having read it twice. All I can say right now is... I want to move to Córdoba. I also FINALLY read <u>The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo</u> by Taylor Jenkins Reid. What a tale. Not going to lie, I did get a bit mixed up now and then, but I'll read it again at some point and I'm sure it will make more sense then.

I received a great review of The Silent Chapter by <u>Briony Molly Media</u> (@itsjust_molly). Molly read the ebook version – unlike all of my other reviewers who preferred physical copies – which in itself made my heart sing as she is committed to supporting indie authors by buying their book. And her review brought tears to my eyes. I won't put the whole thing here, but she said, "This is one of the best debut books I have read in a while, and can safely say it is in my top ten favourites. ... The amount of research and respect that has gone into writing this book is in itself a 5-star rating. ... It is easy to follow and digest making the book a pleasurable read." All in all, she gave it four and a half stars. Thank you, Molly!

And by far the most nerve-wracking thing that happened to me in March was my radio interview with Babs Michel of BBC Three Counties Radio on 14th March. I got in contact with her wonderful producer Kimberley on the 13th, and within 24 hours the interview was all recorded and ready to air! Babs completely put me at ease and we chatted about how I came to write and self-publish The Silent Chapter. BREAD AND BUTTER PUDDING

Winter recipe? Probably! But nothing wrong with a little warm comfort now and again. Best served hot.

INGREDIENTS

8 slices crustless white bread

75g caster sugar

½ tsp mixed spice

2 eggs

300ml double cream

150ml milk

2tsp demerara sugar

METHOD

Cut each slice of bread into three. Butter each, and lay in three layers into a dish. First two layers butter side down, last one butter side up. Mix mixed spice into the caster sugar and sprinkle between each layer.

Whisk together the eggs, cream, milk and demerara. Pour over the bread and soak for half an hour.

Sprinkle with a little more demerara and bake at 180C/350F/Gas 4 for 30-40 minutes.


