



Hello everyone!



The Cake With All The Letters (Kladdkaka)

I'd never heard of kladdkaka (Swedish chocolate cake) until Sabrina Kane put it in <u>one of her upcoming books</u>. But when I beta read it, I Googled it and discovered that not only did it look delicious, I actually had the ingredients in! An hour later, this was created. Crunchy and squidgy, it's every chocolate lover's dream! Recipe credit to Buzzfeed Tasty.



INGREDIENTS:

265g caster sugar 2 eggs 60g plain flour 30g cocoa powder 115g melted butter 1tsp vanilla 1tbsp solid butter 1tbsp cocoa powder

METHOD:

Grease a 8-inch cake tin with butter, then line with the tbsp of cocoa powder.


In a bowl, beat the sugar and eggs until pale yellow.

Sift in the flour and cocoa powder, and fold.

Mix in the melted butter and vanilla.

Pour in the batter and smooth it out.

Bake for 20 minutes at Gas 4/180C/350F. The top will have hardened but the inside will be soft. Serve with



cream and fruit.
